## **Convergence: Our Annual Exhibition of Art & Learning**

CAPE's Convergence exhibition, now in its seventh year, featured work representing the 1000+ students who participate in CAPE's inschool programs, which reach all regions of the city, elementary age students, high school students, and students with disabilities. This year, Convergence was held in a 5,000 square foot gallery at Mana Contemporary Chicago in Pilsen from November 14 to November 19.

Convergence displayed the ongoing innovations in teaching, learning, and art making that are central to CAPE's work. One exhibition highlight was the student work from Boone Elementary, a highly diverse community school with over 40 languages spoken within the student body. Students studied bird anatomy and behaviors and then designed wearable bird structures that represented their personal and cultural identities. Finally, the students created and performed for the community individual and group choreography to match each of their sculptures. *(Continued on Page 2)*

From November 14 to 19, CAPE held three professional development sessions for a total of 120 teachers and teaching artists who learned from experiencing our students' work in the Mana Contemporary gallery. The professional development meetings included CPS music, visual art, dance and theatre teachers who are a part of the CPS Fine and Performing Arts Magnet Cluster Program, teachers and teaching artists who are working in newly established CAPE partnerships, and a group of 30 teachers from Waukegan Public Schools who are learning about CAPE's approaches to collaboration and arts integration.

More than 100 CAPE supporters, teachers, artists, and Board and Associate Board members attended a reception on Wednesday November 15, where veteran CAPE Teaching Artist and recent 3Arts Awardee William Estrada gave a striking speech on the value of CAPE's work in supporting community empowerment through the arts. ## **CAPE VOCABULARY**

**Inquiry Question:** Each team of CAPE teachers and teaching artists work together to identify an open-ended inquiry question that will guide them and their students. These inquiry questions are often inspired by the students' own interests and provide a framework for the project without dictating the end results.

**Professional Development (PD):** PD is how we describe the ongoing series of interactive workshops that our teachers and teaching artists attend together. PD sessions are led by CAPE staff, researchers, visiting artists, and experts from the field, and help our teaching teams plan, share, and reflect on their projects with peers who share their goals and struggles.
