

CAPE VOCABULARY

Documentation: Each team of CAPE teachers and teaching artists is trained in how to document their own work and growth over the course of a project, as well as that of their students. This documentation may be writing, photos, video, audio, or exhibition, and is used by CAPE staff and researchers and the educators themselves to understand the process and outcomes of the project.

Reflection: A key piece of our work in schools is reflection. Through reflection on their experiences throughout a project, teachers, teaching artists, and students can understand their successes, struggles, and growth, and then use those new understandings as a jumping-off point for future work. The CAPE staff also uses reflection as a tool for program improvement.

Collaboration Laboratory: A Program in Jeopardy

The National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) is under attack, yet again, by members of Congress who have threatened for years to eliminate funding for our nation's cultural institutions. The NEA, with its current annual budget of \$148 million, or a minuscule 0.003% of the federal discretionary budget in 2016, enjoys widespread public support and has an outsized impact on the organizations and communities that its grant support. And yet, The Heritage Foundation, a conservative research think tank, calls the NEA "welfare for cultural elitists" and insisting that "the NEA does not promote charitable giving." CAPE is one of many NEA grant recipients who uses its funding to support struggling communities through hands-on programs; 80% of CAPE students are from low income families, and one would be hard-pressed to argue that the other 20% qualify as "cultural elitists."

Collaboration Laboratory (Co-Lab), the CAPE program that fuels our long-term work in Chicago Public Schools, is funded in part by a grant from the NEA. In Co-Lab, teachers and artists who are new to arts integration make a two-year commitment to learning the CAPE model and implementing it into their classrooms. During their time in Co-Lab, the teacher-teaching artist teams participate in intensive and ongoing training and mentorship, which set them up for long-term success. After their time in Co-Lab, many teams go on to teach together in our Artist/Researcher Program alongside dozens of other established, long-term partners. Thus, our teachers and artists continue, year after year, to use the arts as a tool for teaching critical thinking, creative problem solving, team work, reflection, and compassion to the students who enter their classrooms, all thanks to an investment by the NEA in their professional growth, personal passions, and life-changing potential.

With all of the troubling news coming from Washington, DC, Springfield, and City Hall, what can you do?
